WASHINGTON — All told, state and local governments committed \$10.6 billion toward taxpayer-funded reproductive services in 2017. That sum represents \$224.7 million spent per day, or \$1.46 billion a month, in taxpayer-funded abortion and contraception. There are 40 abortions performed in a single day (about 1 in 70 women), and Planned Parenthood and other abortion providers give birth control without cost to about 730 women a day (about 1 in 16 women). The Center for Biological Diversity released data Tuesday from its annual tally of state spending on reproductive care. Most of the money, \$9.7 billion, went toward contraception, such as birth control, not abortion. Although abortions are not covered under federal Medicaid or the billions in mandatory federal spending for family planning, the two are intertwined through Medicaid funding for abortion providers. Altogether, taxpayers spend \$115.7 billion annually for reproductive care, including contraception, said Leah Carr, executive director of the National Institute of Reproductive Health, which analyzed the data. “This is an extraordinary amount of money spent on reproductive health care,” Carr said. “That’s more than just about health care, in any other service you can imagine, especially abortion.” The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services counts \$9.2 billion in federal spending on family planning, which includes family planning services, screening and contraception. Those federal funds are added to an estimated \$20 billion in state and local spending for family planning and \$13 billion for contraception nationally. Another \$4.4 billion in state spending is funded by federal block grants. During the past seven decades, the total spending on health care services has increased dramatically, from about \$90 billion in 1950 to \$3.3 trillion in 2017. Carr points to recent changes in government regulations and clinic closures as
